KARUNAR KHETI TRUST & ITS PRINCIPLES OF ACTION

<u>Karunar Kheti Trust</u> (established July 30, 2019) is an early-stage rural nonprofit institution *built by the people, for the people* to work at the pace of our rural community for contextually empowering development in the interconnected areas of education, health, and livelihood, and is rooted in one of the typical rural areas of Assam that comprises its tea-plantations and traditional villages.

Our work, as such, is fundamentally grounded by our Principles of Action:

- 1. Empower communities directly disempowered by problems to become a part of the solution
- 2. Listen to communities to build wholesome empowering movements mindfully of the communities' capability & capacity, scale of economy, pace of its culture, and wisdom of its consciousness
- 3. Develop ground-up & contextual, which if required must be firstprinciples based, real-world-applicable practical systems & processes for
 - a. Manifesting the coherent wisdom~skills of the individual~collective heart~body~mind
 - b. Discipline of truth & compassion
 - c. Participatory processes
 - d. Living wholesomely with the non-human world, which include animals, soil, plants, lakes, rivers, and mountains.









FOREWORD BY OUR FOUNDER

Development as Freedom^{*} Borne of Practical Frameworks of Being Peaceful

It anything is but uncommon knowledge there is such wisdom and its practices that if embodied can cultivate, at least, a baseline of individual & collective resilience, peace, joy, and creativity empoweringly as an fundamental response to our most commonly unifying existential humancondition of suffering.**

And such *embodiment of being peaceful*, I observe, can lead to creating a strong, *arguably even a fundamental*, platform to respond to *practical problems* that individuals & communities face and wish to solve, and, therefore, towards *practical solutions* for inclusive & sustainable *development as freedom* where we must now attempt to make *coherent in wholesomeness* human life & non-human life, local & global, science & religion, politics & truth, thinking & doing, modern & traditional, rural & urban, and a list of the other *fragmented, isolated, divided, to intractably conflicted & distressingly polarized aspects of individuals, culture, consciousness & institutions arising out of a fear based*, and thus a disempoweringly negative, response to such a human condition of suffering as well as the profound practical problems we face today.

In summary, such *development as freedom* can possibly move us all out of, what I observe, *deeply systemic cycles of a disempowering suffering* at all levels of existence on our planet.

As such, based on such a perspective of development as freedom, for our work in education, I invite the reader to read **Deepening Compassion**, Its **Discipline & Concentration (page 1, Key Highlights/Education)** and **Emergent Competency-Based & Encouraging Learning-From-Failure Assessment System (page 7, Spotlight)** where we tersely note some aspects of such practical frameworks with children, teachers and parents, its challenges, and progress.

^{**}Suffering is used here anything but negatively disempoweringly or in *fear*, but in line with philosophy of Dhamma where I see it as it is the empowering acceptance of certain realities of life that affect us all, and which can lead to a positively empowering response of *freedom*.

Our school's sports teacher, *Gunjan Patra's* work with children & youth of our area noted in A Spark of a Youth-Led Movement (page 8, Spotlight), I contemplate on the basis of a portrait of *building the essential discipline that such freedom requires* through physical & mental exercises and sports, without which it can be reduced to just a vision or a dream.

In developing such frameworks of development as freedom, it has been a particular challenge to observe the challenges of our livelihood leader, *Rajib Patra*, as he started taking over the reins of our model **Mushroom Cultivation** unit as it was reeling from an *extreme outbreak of Green Mold* that destroyed months of hopeful efforts of our team (*page 2, Key Highlights/Livelihood Development*) and they literally started afresh as no factor(s) could be isolated as the cause(s) for this confounding phenomena, or at least so for us.

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KEY HIGHLIGHTS

Education

Selenghat Valley School

Deepening Compassion, Its Discipline & Concentration

We significantly deepened our process & practices to develop our compassion and its discipline, where, for example, in our *morning process* (a wholesome process to ground ourselves daily in the wellbeing of our heart~mind~body and its interbeing with larger life) we, at the rate of a people, significantly deepened:

- Caring for plants & soil, where, particularly, we moved to developing next-level systems~processes~practices for composting & mindfully giving such nutrients to the plants.
- And similarly for inorganic waste management to develop next-level systems~processes~practices to segregate & dispose of sustainably such waste, and, in general, continue our efforts to mindfully further reduce consumption which of plastics, includes. led by our students. implementing~developing a Towards Zero Plastic Waste policy.

Last, but not the least, our long-term developing practices of **heart~body~mind in movement~breathing-stillness** are beginning to acquire a deeper & mature quality.

Parent Engagement

Due to the developments highlighted in the previous section and efforts noted in our previous newsletter, we recorded a parentengagement of 85%, which is anything but an ordinary milestone. This is also the first time that we noted the details leading to this data with increasing levels of analytical clarity and, as such, this statistic is based on aggregating data from several kev tributaries that comprise our wholesome effort to engage with parents, spanning our formal Hridoyar Kotha meetings (Conversation from the Heart) to personal visits & meetings.

SVS is financially supported by parents & guardians, <u>SSK Exports Ltd</u>, and several individual donors.

Collaboration with Government Schools & Anganwadi Centres

In collaboration with <u>Wipro Foundation</u> we are moving along on the basis of a fairly comprehensive, even if still exploratory, 3year framework with 6 major outcomes to collaboratively work with the local govt schools of the area, which currently are at the Anganwadi and Lower Primary (LP) level. These outcomes are:

- 1. Core Trust based Relationship to Explore Collaboration
- A Community of Students~Teachers~Parents Rooted in a Collective Confidence of Heart~Body~Mind that Facilitates Trust-Based Meaningful Relationships
- 3. Theoretical Knowledge of ECCE (Early Childhood Care and Education)
- 4. Practical Knowledge as well as Ability to Practice ECCE
- Theory ~ Practice of Assessment as a Continuous & Wholesome Observation~Feedback System
- 6. Ability for Ground-Up & Principled Curriculum Development

Having started with 5 schools at various stages of steps 1 & 2 of this framework, we have moved forward to start including aspects of 3 & 4 in 3 schools.

Our Govt. School Collaboration work is supported by <u>Wipro Foundation</u> Education Grant.

Livelihood Development

Organic Farming & Mushroom Cultivation

Our mushroom farming team went through a process of deep immersion in the past few months while recovering from an extreme outbreak of **Green Fungus/Mold** due to which 800 cylinders got damaged.

The spread of green mold is utterly contagious and can spread rapidly. The team had to take some drastic measures due to which production was halted completely to start the cycle afresh. This experience turned out to be a blessing in disguise for the team, rich with a lot of learnings and revealed other areas of improvement in the production cycle.

During the July-September period, the team was able to make and put into production 800 cylinders with a potential to produce, at least, 800 kgs of mushroom. Thus far, 100 kgs of mushroom have been harvested.

The team has also started another mushroom farming unit in the community in line with the vision for making it a sustainable livelihood option for the community.

Exploring Tailoring as a Livelihood Generation Option

An exploratory tailoring unit was started with 3 SHG women on 19th July, 2024. This initiative has been entirely led by the SHG women.

The space for setting up the tailoring unit was offered by an elderly woman in the community who had a small shop by the roadside. The Village Organisation (VO) offered a grant of Rs. 8,500 to the women to buy a new sewing machine from their accumulated savings.

The 3 women spend around 1.5 hours every day at the tailoring unit and managed to receive 48 orders through door-to-door visits. They have been able to earn a total income of Rs. 4,470 with a net profit of Rs. 2,810 during the July-September period.

Organisational Development

Since the past few months, we have been working towards strengthening our participatory processes internally with our team members and externally by sharing our work and engaging with our local community. We have also made significant progress in strengthening our financial processes by building the capacity of the team and drafting/finalisation of organisational policies. Some highlights from such work include:

- Drafting and finalisation of Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (PoSH) Policy and a staff sensitisation (facilitated by Fincubator session Ltd.) followed Advisors Pvt. by selection of Internal Complaints Committee members.
- First Annual Review of our Personnel Policy with staff and board members which included a comprehensive review of all the clauses of the policy with necessary additions and modifications.
- Finalising expenditure budget heads in Tally. This will enable us to assign expenses in pre-defined budget categories for smooth financial management and reporting of expenses.
- Designing our books of accounts, including the year ending formal audit reports in a participatory process & collaboration between our accounting staff & CA, reflecting our staff's significant empowerment with respect to a ground-up driven experiential understanding of the complete cycle of basic accounting to the highest level audit reports that truly reflects the depths of our work.

- Physical verification of all our assets and assigning codes to keep track of all our fixed assets.
- Quarterly reporting (April-June, 2024) of our work and expenses to our board members
- Deepening community participation with SHG members and tea estate management to share with them about our work, receive feedback and explore further scope of improvement and engagement.
- Publishing our first Quarterly Newsletter for April to June, 2024
- Financial Support of 5 Lakhs from Smile Foundation to support our work in education.
- Establishing and strengthening relationships with district-level government departments for growth of our school and fundraising purposes.

We would continue to build on this momentum in the coming months.



SPOTLIGHT

Emergent Competency-Based & Encouraging Learning-From-Failure Assessment Systems

While there are several emergent points under a formal framework of systematic competency-based assessment system and as also discussed significantly in the National Education Policy 2020, and based on which our head teacher, Sangita Gogoi, is also taking a course at Azim Premji University (APU, Bangalore), we are observing that, and as Sangita is also feeling validated as she takes her course, such points are naturally emerging as we work deeply immersed in the freedom perspective of education that empowers a child's curiosity and ability to interact with life, and ,as such, also its problems, spanning immediately urgent to existential.

Continuing from such a journey's work in the previous quarter, in key aspects we reached significant levels of maturity and with heartening feedback from the students as well as teachers. For example:

- Learning-From-Failure processes are made a deep part of the wholesome process that invite & encourage students to learn from their failures, which feels like anything but a non-trivial step forward to embrace the great and even fundamental freedom & joy of learning
- Wholesome System: Going significantly beyond the usual half-yearly & year-end exams, we have created a significantly richer & diverse system that includes, for example, several smaller assessments, and to encourage self-learning & problem-solving abilities, self-study assignments & projects. We envision that as children get older, they increasingly become independent~collaborative self-learners, and as such, empowered with the freedom & discipline of curiosity & problem-solving.
- Teachers significantly developed their processes for creating as well as grading such assessments

Our Assessment System as Innovative, Its Profound Challenge of Balance, and The Middle Way

Such systems of assessment, in our context and arguably in most contexts of India, can be considered to be, and even rightfully & fundamentally, **innovative**, especially in the great challenge from the normalization of rote-systems of learning & assessments, and thus, this great expectation of parents that schools feel like a force as real as gravity. Over time we have faced several such challenges and learning from its failures~successes has taught us that the *Middle Way* can be a starting point, to at least be compassionately & deeply listening and open to learning from/in systems we are interacting with.

A stepping stone in this *Middle Way* is, at least for now, *implementing numerical marking system much earlier than we would like to* — ideally, we would not like to use numerical marking till at least the beginning of the Middle stage of education (Class 6 onwards), but because our parents currently, and in a sense, also rightfully, are unable to, with interest and even meaning, interact with a system without such numerical marks, we have started it significantly earlier in the Preparatory stage (Class 3 onwards).

We envision that as we, collectively as students, teachers, parents, and community, build more trust and get feedback of more tangible results based on our processes, we can keep adjusting such and, in general, the path of this *Middle Way*.

In a sense, our greatest effort is to remain determined, persistent, and consistent in practicing the profound wisdom of the *Middle Way*.

SPOTLIGHT

A Spark of a Youth-Led Movement: Selenghat Community Sports Club

Our Sports Teacher from Selenghat Valley School, Gunjan Patra, has started a sports club to provide a platform and empower the youths from tea plantations to pursue certain competitive career avenues such as Police and Army as well as to inculcate the habit of sports and holistic development that it offers. Since the past 5 months, a group of around 30 community youths around the age group of 13-17 years can be seen every day in the playground following a strict regimen of warm-up exercises, athletics, football, and meditation.

Gunjan is trying to bridge a much-needed gap in career paths as well as formal coaching which the youths from tea garden areas cannot access adequately. "Very few youths from tea garden areas manage to get into the Police or the Army. They have to travel to Teok town which is around 10km away to access formal sports coaching and it is often difficult due to the distance and financial constraints. So, I decided to start a freely accessible club for our community youths." He observes that youths from tea plantation areas get easily distracted by mobile phones and take up addictive behaviours such as consumption of pan masala. "They need a platform where the discipline of sports will help keep them on the right path."




